The first will publicise our slow riding events, co-ordinated by Alan Yandall, and the second Look Lean & Roll co-ordinated by Rob Beasley.

Both guys have small dedicated teams of Observers helping people to develop specific skills alongside their individual observed rides. These are just two examples of positive contributions to HBAM's important role of enhancing road safety.

I am aware of other work is being done by HBAM members; I am always happy to receive a brief note on an activity, together with a photograph, and I will plan them into programme of regular timed pieces for INFORM. My aim is to keep HBAM's excellent work in the news but spaced out, so we don't become commonplace!
